

Looking On the Other Side of the World for RS

Not often seen are the RS Suhl (sometimes Germany) reverse image pieces. These exotic decorated images, so finely detailed and different from all other portraits, display at least six different ladies, that to date, have gone nameless by our collectors club. So few of them have ever surfaced there is still a mystique about who they are. The thought is that very few of them were ever produced.

I have had the good fortune in the past to find a few of these ultra-rare beauties, as well as to bid on them at auction. On a trip to Quebec a dozen years ago, I found a tea cup and saucer in an antique mall housed in a building that had at one time in the past had been a weaving factory. What an unexpected thrill, especially where Limoges and France porcelain pieces were the norm!

The two matched Vases in the photo (large - 10 ¾" tall) were found in Australia six to eight months ago. They are both unmarked on a very unusual mold; a mold I am not familiar with. The images speak for themselves, believing that the pair is RS Suhl.

I would like to tell you I found this pair in a little antique shop tucked away in the "Olde Town" district, while vacationing in Sydney. Sounds like a wonderful and fitting story, doesn't it? Well, the truth is I did find the matched pair in Australia, but I found them while surfing on the internet late one night, browsing in some obscure category that I probably should had never been in to start with!

Maybe one day I can get to Australia and do the real deal! ☆

The first big RS Prussia Auction of the year was held in Manheim, PA on Saturday, May 14, 2011. RS Prussia member, Harlan Miller, who passed away within the past year, had his collection presented by the Conestoga Auction Company. For those of you scratching your head, Manheim is about 1½ hours west of Philadelphia and immediately South of I-76. From Harrisburg it is about 30 minutes east. Little Manheim has a population of under 4700 people.

From the start, the auction was totally different than I imagined. Following it online, I could only guess that a huge crowd had showed up for the big event. Prices from the start seem to leap all over the map, before a pattern started to emerge. Low end florals were soft to very weak, while toothpick holders jumped off the cliff and could be picked up for around \$30 to \$50 for some beautiful and hard to find floral. Sugar shakers and hatpin holders didn't fare much better and usually could be found moving out the door somewhere around \$80.

Scenic, Portrait, Bird, and Animal pieces were all over the map. A wonderful matched pair of RS Ostrich shakers went for only \$350, while a similar pair of Hummingbird/Parrot shakers did the same. A wonderful matched pair of red décor ciders portraying the Melon Eater and Dice Player went for \$600 and \$550 respectively, very reasonable.

The first big piece of the day, a black double scene Swan & Man in the Mountain Humidor brought \$2600, quite a bit off its record of \$7500 just a few years ago. Surprisingly, Lions and

Tigers had their day. A wonderful iridescent Lion compote climbed to a \$4000 bid. This seems fairly high, but add the 13% buyers premium and the winning bidder coughed up a whopping \$4520!

An out-of-the-world 10½" ornate Tiger vase hammered out at \$3750! And not to be forgotten was a wonderful Children's Lion and Tiger Tea Set finding a home for \$4000 + juice. A superb bowl with five large portraits of the Season ran out of gas at \$2600, while a "top shelf" seven piece berry set with the Dice Thrower brought in a respectable \$3400.

It was the RS Cobalt 11½" Dice Thrower than turned heads at a high \$4000. Of interest were at least five, yes FIVE, large 14½" floral center bowls that went from a bargain \$800 all the way up to \$2500 range.

The premier lot of the day was Lot # 266, a 23 piece child's set in the extremely rare Admiral Peary. With some of the best Peary graphics I have ever seen on a child's set, this beauty broke the bank at a whopping \$6500, or \$7345 with the juice!

All in all, it appears that prices for RS Prussia may have turned the corner, at least for the high-end pieces. ★

Rare Four Portrait Jug with Verbiage Discovered

Most RSP collectors relish both auctions and discovering items that are unique. Such was the case in March 2011 at a Charlottesville, Virginia auction. The Harlowe-Powell Auction Gallery held an auction that included a large holding of R.S. Prussia, some E.S. (Erdman Schlegelmilch) items, antique furniture, rugs and other continental porcelains.

I was fortunate in acquiring an unusual four portrait E.S. jug. What struck me as being most extraordinary is that the text “The four Seasons” is painted below one of the portraits. This is the first example that I have seen, either on R. S. Prussia or E.S. porcelain that actually attributes portraits to the seasons by including written text. The E.S. renderings show women, who although some have speculated they symbolized the seasons of the year, it was not as evident as the R.S. Prussia renderings. This jug evidences that the E.S. factory, as well as the decal designers, intended that these portraits were indeed allegorical representations of the four seasons.

The jug is marked with the E.S. Royal Saxe mark with additional numerals, which probably represent the production lot number and date, and/or the factory employee identification. In addition to the four portraits that encircle the jug, the jug has a purple luster background with an irregular gold geometric pattern and grayish purple stippling. The handle is highlighted with gold.

While the R.S. Prussia women who depict the four seasons are more obvious, with their floral props and season-appropriate backdrops, the E.S. ladies are not as precise. One must look closely at the floral wreaths in the women’s hair to discern which season is being represented. Winter is

perhaps the easiest, with holly being shown. Autumn is less apparent, because the wreath contains poppies (not an autumn flower) and some fading autumn leaves. The portrait representing spring appears to be wearing daisies, and the portrait representing summer appears to be wearing dogwood. I will defer to others who are more versed in horticulture to identify these floral wreaths.

It is interesting that the existing guide books and catalogs do not identify these E.S. ladies specifically as “the four seasons”, but simply as women with floral wreaths or laurel crowns. This jug, with its lettering inscribed at the factory, definitively identifies them as the four seasons. The identifying text appears below the portrait that seems to represent summer.

I plan to bring this jug to the next R.S. Prussia convention and display it at the Rare and Unusual seminar for all to see. I wish to make special mention of the Harlowe-Powell Auction Gallery (<http://www.harlowepowell.com/main/>) that was very hospitable and helpful by prominently displaying the R.S. Prussia club membership brochures which were readily taken by auction attendees. Hopefully, some new memberships resulted from this initiative. I encourage our club members, especially the officers and directors, to initiate the distribution of our membership brochures at shows and auctions.

The acquisition of this unusual E.S. jug is another example that, regardless of how long one collects R.S. Prussia and its related porcelain, there are still new discoveries and information to be found. ☆


